Brendan Sammon will take charge of his second Leitrim SFC decider today, having been the man in the middle as Glencar/Manorhamilton completed a hat trick of titles with victory over St Mary's-Kiltoghert in 2010. The experienced whistler has been refereeing in Leitrim since 2007 and over that period has taken charge of numerous finals at all levels including ACL Division 1 finals, the IFC decider between Gortletteragh and St. Patrick's Dromahair in 2012. He has refereed outside the county on many occasions, taking charge of Connacht MFC and MFL games.



Brendan is a former club player with Aughnasheelin over his playing career, and featured in the unique MFC A decider between Aughnasheelin and Ballinamore Sean O Heslin's in 1984, two teams from the Oughteragh Parish. In more recent times captured a JFC B medal with victory over St Osnat's in the noughties. He has been a great servant to his club and having previously held the roles of Cathaoirleach and Rúnaí. Brendan is a director of Sammon Builders and is married to current Aughnasheelin Rúnaí, Shirley, and they have three children Cormac, Aoife and Cian. Cormac is a member of the Intermediate Finalists Panel today so it will have been a hectic morning in the Sammon household!

His umpires are Padraig Sammon, Joe McGirl, Gary Prior and Jerome McWeeney.

#### **Intermediate Final Referee – Gareth Foley (Melvin Gaels)**

Gareth Foley has been refereeing since 2006, while he was still a playing member with Melvin Gaels. Over the intervening years he has taken charge of finals in all grades including Under 21 A and B, the JFC A decider in 2016 between Aughavas and Ballinamore – Sean O Heslin's and a number of ACL League finals including the ACL Division 2 Final of 2011 between Ballinamore-Sean O Heslin's and Kiltubrid. His assignments at provincial level have included games the Connacht MFL and FBD League.



A former club and county player, Gareth has represented Leitrim at all levels and played in Connacht Championship Finals at Senior, Junior, Under 21 and Minor level unfortunately having to settle for a runner up medal on each occasion. He has the unique achievement of sharing in Leitrim's two most recent Connacht MFL victories, in 1991 he was a star wing back in 2014 was a selector on the winning team. As a player Gareth won a SFC medal with the Gaels in 1998 in 1992 won an IFC League and Championship double. He managed Melvin Gaels to their historic first ever MFC A title in 2016. A Carpenter by trade and Bus Company director, Gareth id married to Christina and they have two daughters Chloe and Saoirse. Saoirse was a member of the Leitrim Ladies U16 panel this year.

His umpires are Joseph Tiffoney, Terry Tiffoney, Daniel Branley and Oisín Walsh.

#### **Aughnasheelin Club History**

Aughnasheelin GAA Club takes its beginning from 1889, when it was part of the Oughteragh Wolfe Tones team set up in the first year that Clubs were organised in Leitrim. Throughout the decades following and turbulent times in the 1930s and ravages of emigration over the years, Aughnasheelin has remained a strong and thriving club.

While our current club facilities are up there with the best in the county, it has take many years of hard work to progress from Mick Gilhoolys field at "the shreheen" to where we are today. We are very proud of our club's facilities, which were developed in 1984 for the centenary year and redeveloped in 2005, and indeed developments continue at our club as we are delighted to have completed our flood lighting project at the club in the past week.

Aughnasheelin has a long history of successful underage teams, and indeed many of todays players on our intermediate team were county winners at all underage levels in Leitrim and represented Aughnasheelin at underage level for Leitrim. Some of our players today progressed to senior intercounty football including Barry McWeeney, Sean McWeeney (previous captain of Leitrim which we are very proud of ), Conor Cullen part of the current panel, and notably Martin McHugh who was goalie on the 1994 Leitrim Connacht Championship winning team.

Aughnasheelin can boast a lot more than football: there are six all Ireland senior scór medals in the club, the current county chairman of Leitrim County Board is an Aughnasheelin man Terence Boyle, Seamus Prior from Aughnasheelin referred the Senior All Ireland Final in 1990, Michael Domican, Brendan Mulvey, Fergal Earley, Joe Earley, Paul Earley & Paddy McManus have all lined out for the Leitim Senior Hurling team and indeed Paul and Paddy are Lory Meagher All Star Hurling Award Winners.

The intermediate championship in 2008 was a momentous occasion for the club, and today's final is another one of those golden moments for the club. We are very proud to be here today, we have worked hard for it, and we hope that it is an enjoyable game for all and will be another historic day for Aughnasheelin.

David was captain of the Senior Team in Roscommon and played on the Railway Cup team for Connacht. David has had a successful coaching career to date, having being part of the Roscommon Senior Team Management, and Manager of St Croans, who got to the All-Ireland Intermediate Club Finals in 2015. This is David's first year in charge in Aughnasheelin, the place in the final was the challenge he set for himself at the

start of year and today that wish has been fulfilled.

Adrian Cullen is former Allen Gaels & Leitrim footballer, married to Cait and father of four children. His son Conor lines out at midfield today for Aughnasheelin and another son Ciaran, also a county minor, is acting as Maor Uisce today. Adrian won an intermediate championship title in 1989 and five Leitrim senior championship titles in 1991, 1996, 1997, 2001 and 2002 with his former club Allen Gaels. Adrian has represented Leitrim at all grades winning a Connacht U21 medal in 1991. This is Adrian's first year to be involved with the Aughnasheelin at senior level, but has coached for many years at underage level in Aughnasheelin and with development squads in Leitrim.

Damien Flynn is from Aughnasheelin, in fact next door to the football field! He is married to Patricia and has three children. This is his first year as a selector with the senior team but Damien has many years of coaching experience with junior teams in the past in the club and at underage levels in the last few years. At an Adult level the club has won the Junior B championships (2001 and 2007), Junior C Championship (2009), Division 3 League title (2011), Division 4 League title (2010) and 2 Division 5 League titles (2004, 2010), as well as promotion to Division 1 in 2015 and 2017. At underage level we have many league and championship titles.


As a club we have seen a number of our players represent us at various county levels, something we are very proud of and we look forward to seeing this continue in future years.













#### I gcuimhne Seosamh Ó Floinn-Cathaoirleach Coiste Chontae Liatroma 2010-2014

Leitrim GAA lost one of its true visionaries over the past year with the passing of **Joe Flynn**, last May. Joe, the most recent former Cathaoirleach of Coiste Chontae Liatroma, a position he worked tirelessly at, served as Cathaoirleach in the years 2010 to 2014 and he led his management and county committee in an exemplary manner throughout this period. This was but just a small period of a lifetime of service to Cumann Lúthchleas Gael in multitude of varying capacities.

Joe was secondary educated in St Mel's College, Longford, with whom he won an All-Ireland Senior Colleges medal in 1963. He backed this up with a Leitrim MFC medal with St Mary's in 1965 and went on to play adult club football with the St Mary's Club into the 1970s. He quickly turned to the administration wing of the GAA and served his club as Chairman for a period during the same decade, while still a very young man. The referee's whistle came calling and Joe was not found wanting, a measure of his all round capability exemplified by the fact that he refereed two Senior Championship Finals. In 1979 he was man in the middle as Ballinamore-Sean O Heslin's defeated Gortletteragh and also refereed the final between the same two teams in 1982, in which the Ballinamore side was also victorious. Throughout this period, Joe was also immersed in Scór and won many county titles and a number of Connacht titles with his club, excelling in Ballad Group. Joe's most recent major role in his club was from 1994-96 when he completed the arduous role as Club Secretary. During that period, specifically 1995, St Mary's had what was arguably their greatest ever season winning the Leitrim SFC, IFC and MFC, a feat that is unlikely to ever be matched. They also reached the Connacht SFC Club final that same season, defeated by Corofin. Joe was a selector on that senior team.

It was inevitable, given his administrative talent, that his county would come calling. He became Cathaoirleach Bord na nÓg in 1990 and held the position for three years. Incidentally, during his tenure Leitrim won the Under 16 Fr Manning Cup in 1990 and the Connacht Minor Football League in 1991, reaching the Connacht MFC final of the same year. In 1995, as Team Manager of the County Vocational Schools team, he led his charges to a Connacht SFC success and an All-Ireland Final appearance in Croke Park in which they were unfortunately defeated by Donegal. With his avid interest in the development of players at a young age, it was no surprise that Joe served Coiste Chontae Liatroma as Coaching officer for a number of years throughout the 1990s. This period coincided with the introduction of outside coaches visiting clubs from the early 1990s and was a valuable outlet for the energies of young student footballers who directed their energies towards helping the young club players of the era. Joe oversaw its implementation in what was groundbreaking at the time. He oversaw the introduction and administration of the forerunners of the modern day Cúl Camps as Summer Camp fever hit many locations through the late 1990s. In 1996 he organised and overseen the very first School of Excellence in Leitrim as the best Under 14 Club Footballers of that year were brought together for a week in Páirc Seán in August of that year. It was novel initiative as Leitrim Captain of that era Declan Darcy and Tyrone's Peter Canavan imparted their knowledge to the youngsters on separate days during that week. A number of these young players went on to wear the County Senior Jersey.

From 2000 to 2009 Joe served as Leitrim's delegate to Connacht Council, a position he held and carried with great distinction, and we are sure that Connacht Council GAA was a much better place given his wisdom and knowledge of all things GAA. His influence extended well beyond the county and provincial boundaries. He served on the Games Administration Committee of Páirc an Chrócaigh 2006-2008, Central Hearings Committee 2009-2012, Central Appeals Committee 2012-2015 and his last position, a second period with the Central Hearings Committee 2015 to present.

Joe never forgot his roots and was essentially a community person who immersed himself in many local organisations for their betterment, no matter how much life threw at him. He became Chairman of the Páirc Seán Mac Diarmada following the retirement of the late George O Toole and held the position until he became Cathaoirleach Coiste Chontae Liatroma in 2010. During the term of his Chairmanship of the Páirc Seán Committee, the new stand came to fruition in 2007 and he was heavily involved in this project. He currently was Treasurer of the Páirc Seán Committee.

Joe was much respected former Principal of Carrick-on-Shannon Community School, a position he held from its opening until he retired in 2009 having previously spent the vast majority of his teaching career in Carrick Vocational School.

Essentially, we in Leitrim GAA will always have fond memories of the impact the genial Joe has had in the administration of GAA affairs in the county and he has left a void that will remain extremely hard to fill. He was a great people person and away from the cut and thrust of GAA decision making and debate he was quite simply great company!

He is sorely missed by Mary, Clodagh, Nicholas, Cormac, Joseph Junior and the extended Flynn family. Ar Dheis Dé go raibh sé.



#### A Brief History of Mohill GAA Club

Back in the 1930's and 40's the great-grandfathers of the players lining out today would not have enjoyed the same glitz, glamour, colour, couture or media coverage when taking the field in a County Final.

Bicycle clips off, pump and connection in the inside pocket, toe-capped boots loosened from the handlebars of the High Nelly and the overcoat rolled into a ball and secured under the spring of the carrier. Bike shoved in under a bush, they were ready for the fray.

They had never heard of the process, down to the wire, blanket defences, small margins, strength and conditioning, hamstrings, cruciates, sports psychologists, backroom teams, development squads, Hawk-Eye, Marty Morrissey, centres of excellence, technical fouls, screwin studs, black cards, fourth officials, GPS trackers, fourth officials, sweepers, winning ugly, stats, maor fóirnes, sponsors, track suits or physios --- and the only spray they would have known about would have been bluestone and washing soda.

The "dressing room" had no walls, a giant oak or chestnut tree provided a canopy of leaves. If a lace broke, someone might have a piece of a whang; socks had lost their colour and had as many holes as a strainer; togs were mainly home-made, with Ranks Flour, Indian Meal or Clarinda imprinted across the arse; the boots were rock-hard from the muck of the last outing and the leather cogs were worn down almost to the soles; legs, thighs and houghs still bore traces of the cow-dung from Ardrum Rock, the Grange or Legonommer. A club official of the time was recalled as announcing "we have fifteen kickers, but only fourteen knickers, so the goalie will have to stand in in his trousers" – a common occurrence at the time. Teams were certainly not worried about making a fashion statement. Referees often wore black – it was usually the Parish Priest or Curate who was entrusted with the whistle.

There was excitement aplenty, with supporters travelling by special trains, horses and waggons, ponies and traps, on bicycles, on foot or crammed into the back of a lorry like a load heading for Drumshanbo Mart. The main thing was to get there, Sunday evening was for football. Marching fife and drum or brass and reed or pipe bands led the heroes on to the field, cheered to the echo by hundreds of supporters, including a fair dash of "comely maidens" in blouses and flowery dresses that had probably come in the famous parcels from America. There were manly struggles, ferocious tackling, schamozzles go leor and Conor McGregor could have picked up a few tips on how to really box. Fr Eugene Cox, the former County Chairman, recalled for me a titanic struggle between his club, Annaduff, and Gorvagh. One of the Annaduff players had only one tooth left, but it was the size of a crocodile's. When the row started, the Gorvagh stalwart, Pat "the Grump" Murphy, flattened him with a haymaker to the jaw. He eventually got up, spitting blood, with his precious tooth in his hand. "Ya hoor ya Grump, how well you found it" was his only retort. A sportsman to the last.

The arrival of the Aughnasheelin, Leitrim Gaels, Glencar Manor and Mohill teams will be different today. Not a bike to be seen around Páirc Sean. The players will emerge from Audis, BMWs, Hyundais, Volkswagens, Dacias, Renaults, Jeeps, Crossovers and hatchbacks, uniformed in club track-suits, with kit bags bursting at the seams with casual gear, bicycle shorts (a sort of a Spanx for men), athletic vests, spare boots, deodorant, gloves, screw-in cogs, hair gel, shampoo and gum shields, most of them wired into an i-phone or an i-pod, as if they were on a drip. They don't need a drip, because the bottle of water is in hand, the manager having told them "hydrate, hydrate", "focus". They troop into the dressing room, doors and windows are closed to the world and the players "get into the zone". After the warm-up, the pep-talk. The knock on the door, time to enter the arena. The walls shake with the thunder of sprinting feet and then they spring over the bench as Willie and James try to calm them for the historic photo. Green and white, purple and green and primrose and blue are raised to the heavens and then comes a cacophony of sound that travels along the N4. Pride in the local parish.

On the terraces and the stands, even the Grannies have agreed to wear the club jackets. So have the Grandas, fathers, mothers, uncles, aunts, cousins, children, teddies, even an occasional dog. Gone are the flowery dresses, replaced by casual tops, club jerseys and skin-tight denims --- the comely maidens of today are certainly making a fashion statement for all to see. The only throw-back to the old days is the marching band. Dessie Foley will lead Kiltubrid, Kiltubrid, with Leitrim Central Council delegate PJ Meehan on the bag-pipes, will lead the captains and the teams around the field, as Brendan Sammon prepares to get the game under-way.

The parade will evoke memories of former County Finals, of stars of the past. of departed players, officials and supporters, of men like Joe Flynn, George O'Toole, Padraig Griffin, Patsy Guckian, John Joe Noone, Josie Murray, Bernard Murray and so many others who worked so hard to provide the magnificent stadium we enjoy today. No, it's not Dublin and Mayo today, but it is our day, our big day, our County Final. And which of us would not long to be out there on the pitch – even if we had to stand in in our trousers.

The time of year again when all roads will head to Carrick-on-Shannon for the biggest day of the club season when it comes to the finals of the Leitrim Club Senior and Intermediate football championships.

It's a special feeling at his time of year for all involved in any capacity, and even with twenty years clocked up, when it comes to occasions like today's, there is a huge element of excitement that you simply can't help but get sucked in by.



Leitrim County Final Day is one that I have been privileged to attend a play a small part in since 1996. Even before then if I go back to my own secondary school days in Drumshanbo. I can clearly remember the excitement around the town in 1991 when Allen Gaels made the big break-through under the late Frank McKeon, who was one of the finest gentlemen of the sport that I had the honour of getting to know in later years. The feeling in the school was electric on the following Monday, it was also a huge help that Sean Wynne (a teacher in the school and now the vice-principal) played at full back on that team and the late Tony McGowan another Leitrim and Drumshanbo stalwart was also a teacher in D.V.S. back then and I also remember Tony enjoying the success.

So for sure GAA dominated the agenda and perhaps even the curriculum for at least one September Monday twenty six years ago. When I started working on County finals back in the mid 1990's the Gaels were also the dominant force for the first couple of years in 96 and 97. The balance of power shifted further north in 98 when Melvin Gaels were successful and again a year later when one of today's finalists Glencar Manorhamilton broke Fenagh hearts with a late winning goal that snatched victory from the jaws of defeat. That particular final provided the most dramatic ending until of course 2015 when Mohill inflicted the same pain on Glencar Manorhamilton in securing the biggest prize on offer in Leitrim Club Football and now of course the sides will do battle again today for the right to enter the winners enclosure later this evening.

Glencar Manorhamilton, in my view, deserve huge credit for their refusal to allow recent defeats in County finals affect them in a negative way. Since completing the hugely impressive four in a row championship triumphs between 2008 and 2011 they have suffered reversals in finals against Melvin Gaels, Mohill and Aughawillan.

2017 is the third year running for the North Leitrim men to return to HQ on final day and no doubt the experience of the aforementioned pain will act as a huge source of motivation for today's decider. Team manager Aidan Rooney will have worked extensively on their collective mental attitudes and how they will handle various possible situations that may arise like the start to last year's final where Tommy McCormack's charges constructed their platform for an eventual victory. Eight finals in ten years is a remarkable record and the experience collected is invaluable.

Padraic Davis will attempt to win the championship for the second time with his current side when he goes up against Rooney in today's side-line battle. Davis is perhaps the most experienced of the two men in charge today and has tasted inter-county managerial experience with Glen Ryan during his time charge in Longford.

In Sligo Aidan Rooney has to be one of the front runners to succeed another Kildare man, Niall Carew in charge of the Yeats County senior Side. Rooney has in the past guided the Sligo minors to a Provincial decider in his short but impressive managerial career. I also have no doubt that the current Mohill manager will manage at inter-county level in the future with his stock high in Leitrim and indeed in his native county.

The ingredients are in place for another very close game today. It would be foolish to predict otherwise going by the evidence that is presented before us. Both sides have, or are in danger of being without key players for the final and with that in mind it could perhaps could come down to strength in depth among other factors. With that in mind I am slightly going for a Mohill win for my by now famously inaccurate County final prediction. But don't rule out a replay!

# Five things we learned during the 2017 Leitrim Club Championships John Connolly

The new format for the Connacht Gold Senior and Fox Monumentals Intermediate Championship wasn't the only new thing about this year's Leitrim Club campaign as we in the Leitrim Observer tried out some new approaches to our coverage in 2017.

The modern world sees the online word as important as print editions, the immediacy of the online world a real plus, so moving with the times, and a little plug here, the Leitrim Observer's own website at www.leitrimobserver.ie did a new column entitled "Five things we learned" throughout the Club Championship campaign.

It gave us a chance to discuss a few topics that might be missed in individual match reports and, to use another modern phrase, take a helicopter view of both the Senior and Intermediate Championships.

The columns, the Senior out on a Monday and the Intermediate on Tuesday, seemed to get a good response and in that spirit, we take a County Final special Five Things we learned during the 2017 Leitrim Club Championship.

#### **TIMING IS EVERYTHING**

Anyone who witnessed Kiltubrid battling to save their Intermediate Championship would have been astonished they been told that day that Leitrim Gaels would be contesting the Final in October and are considered by many to be favourites! That day against Kiltubrid they were badly off the pace but have been transformed by the knockout stages so timing your effort right is huge.

#### **OLD FIRM STILL HOLDS SWAY**

The emergence of new exciting teams in Ballinamore and Kinlough meant we thought this year, there could be a shake-up in the pecking order in Leitrim. Instead, it is the Old Firm who still holds sway as only Melvin Gaels have contested a Senior Final outside of Mohill, Glencar/Manorhamilton, Aughawillan and St. Mary's Kiltoghert have contested a Final since 2009! Out of eight finals from 2010 up to today, Glencar/Manorhamilton will have contested six, St. Mary's four, Mohill three and Aughawillan two so the more things change, the more they stay the same!

# AUGHNASHEELIN THE ONLY UNBEATEN TEAM Mobill and Glangar/Manorhamilton both suffer

Mohill and Glencar/Manorhamilton both suffered one loss in the Group stages and Leitrim Gaels lost twice in the Intermediate so Aughnasheelin go into Finals day as the only team without a loss. The only points they dropped came against Ballinaglera when they drew 1-11 apiece so can they finish off the campaign unbeaten today?

#### **NEW FORMAT A WINNER**

If you listened to fans midway through the new Group system, you'd have got the impression that the new format was a total disaster with everyone complaining incredibly that there were too many games. Six weeks later, I don't think they can be any complaints as there have been competitive games, lots of shocks and drama.

Now there are some issues where teams could get hammered in their first three games and then resurrect their year with victories in the last two games, something Dromahair did to great effect this year, and there was quite an amount of one-sided games at Senior level.

The County Board are undertaking an extensive review and they might consider tweaking the system in various ways and maybe spreading the competition out a bit longer to allow players some rest time but overall, the new system has been a success.

So take a bow Mohill GAA Club whose motion proposed the new system, Allen Gaels who proposed a slightly different system, the clubs of the county and the Leitrim County Board for being open to new ideas. Change isn't a bad thing and certainly not in this case.

- The gate "takings" at the Senior final was £197.
- Fenagh won the Junior Championship, beating Glencar by 2-4 to 0-3 in the Final.
- The Minor Championship was won by Drumshanbo, beating Dromahair in the Final.
- Gortletteragh became the first club to open their own club grounds on 13 August 1967
- Fr Barney Doyle was Co Board Chairman and Tomás Ó Riordáin was Rúnaí.

## 25 Years Ago - 1992

- Leitrim beat London in Ruislip by 3-17 to 2-10 in the first round of the Connacht Championship. Another disappointing loss to Roscommon in the semi-final, 2-12 to 2-10
- P J Carroll resigns as Bainisteoir and in comes John O'Mahony
- In the National League on 1 November, Leitrim draw with Cork, the All Ireland Champions.
- Leitrim's under 21s won the Hastings Cup
- Aughawillan won the first of their three-in-a-row of senior titles beating Carrigallen 0-10 to 1-6.
- Aughawillan advance to the Connacht Senior Club Final, losing out to Knockmore i bPáirc Achadh an Mhuilinn in the rain.
- Ballinaglera win their first ever Championship beating Dromahair in the Junior Final, after a replay. St Mary's are Minor Champions.
- Tony McGowan was Cathaoirleach of Leitrim Co Board and Tomás Ó Móráin was Rúnaí.

Leitrim Hurlers Day in Croke Park Le Seán Ó Súilleabháin



Leitrim in an All Ireland Final in Croke Park! Ní tharlaíonn sé sin go minic. We were often represented there on the big occasions, like when Colm O'Rourke, an Aughavas man, played for Meath in All Ireland Football Finals or when Séamus Prior refereed the 1991 All Ireland Football Final or when the Aughnasheelin Ballad Group, All Ireland Scór winners, sang at the interval, but a Leitrim team, in hurling of football, taking to the pitch is another story.

On 10 Meitheamh 2017, Leitrim Senior hurlers achieved a life-time's dream when they took the field on the hallowed ground in the Lory Meagher Cup Final against Warwickshire. A good Leitrim crowd turned up to see this unique event. Leitrim people recalled the rare occasions when the green and gold of Leitrim graced the same pitch.

On 10 Samhain 1914, Leitrim played Cork there in the semi-final of the Croke Cup. Cork won. On 10 October 1938, Leitrim played Kildare in the All Ireland Junior "Home" Final and won by 1-6 to 0-5. They forgot, however, that there were no medals given out until they had played and beaten London. Two weeks later, after a "good" night in the Belvedere Hotel, they lost to London in Croke Park. In 1959, Leitrim lost to Derry in the National League Semi-final in Croke Park. Who will ever forget our 1994 showdown with Dublin in the All Ireland Senior Football Semi-final? A memorable occasion, although Dublin won. In 2006, we lost the Tommy Murphy Cup Final to Louth at headquarters. Our only football success in Croke Park was achieved by the Leitrim ladies who beat Wexford in the All Ireland Intermediate Final in 2007.

In Hurling, Leitrim won the All Ireland "C" Under 16 final in Croke Park in 1983.

The crunch match was against Sligo in Páirc Sheáin and there the Leitrim lads played the game of their lives winning by 3-15 to 3-8. Croke Park was the next stop.

"There were men from Dublin and from Cork, Fermanagh and Tyrone......" So goes the famous ballad Seán South from Garryowen. Leitrim were boosted by men from Galway, Dublin and Cork but the bulk of the panel play with Iomáint Chora Droma Rúisc, with Cluainín Iomáint and Iomáint Bhéal an Atha Móir well represented as well. However, the man who originally came from Kurdistan in Iraq, Zak Moradi, was the centre of attention in the build-up to the game. Leitrim put up an outstanding performance in the first half and, confounding the pundits, led at half-time by two points. However, Warwickshire, driven by former Antrim great, Liam Watson, ruled the roost in the second half and won by 0-17 to 0-11. All in all, it was an outstanding achievement by Bainisteoir, Martin Cunniffe, assisted by his team of Michael Coleman, Paddy O'Connor and Miream Cunniffe to reach the final and to give Leitrim folk a day in Páirc an Chrócaigh.

## Leitrim Hurlers Day in Croke Park



Saturday 26 August day was a special day for hurling in Leitrim. At the Ionad Sármhaitheasa Liatroma in Annaduff, Leitrim's under 16 hurlers won the All Ireland Under 16 "C" title, beating An Lú in the semi-final by 2-9 to 2-8 and beating Dún na nGall in the final by 3-12 to 1-3.

What was remarkable about this win was that Leitrim had a panel of just sixteen players, and fifteen of the sixteen play with Iomáint Chora Droma Rúisc. The odd one out being Cluainín's Michael O'Brien.

To make the success even more special, the trophy for this competition is named after a great Leitrim hurler, the late Stephen Dorrigan from Gortletteragh. What an occasion then when the trophy was presented to the Leitrim captain, Seán O Ríordáin, by Stephen's mother and father, Helena and Mickey Dorrigan.

While underage hurling in Leitrim is in crisis at the moment, the Carrick-on-Shannon club took the brave decision a couple of years ago to play in Roscommon and this has proved an incredible success. It is amazing that just one club could backbone a county team to win such a competition. If only two or three more hurling clubs could do the same in Leitrim.

The Leitrim team was managed by Hilary Phelan, assisted by Niall Ó Riordáin, Timmy White and Ray Kelleher, who, ironically, was a member of the last Leitrim team to win this competition in 1983.

Way back in 1983, Leitrim won this title beating Longford in the Final in Croke Park and, with much the same team they won the corresponding Minor title in 1984.
