The 2019 Connacht Gold Senior and Smith Monumentals Intermediate Football Championships have reached their date with destiny as four clubs and their supporters arrive in Avantcard Páirc Seán Mac Diarmada with equal degrees of hope, confidence and anticipation of what may unfold this afternoon. The championships have ebbed and flowed since the last weekend of July and CCC Liatroma deserves great recognition for efficient manner with which it has delivered on its schedule to bring us to this day. While the weather has been largely unfavourable over the past two months, all games were played in accordance with what was laid out and the grounds people at the various venues which hosted matches throughout the season are to be applauded for having facilities in great shape all through.

We took a decision last December to restructure our competitions through this year's concluding stages and while the season has ended with disappointment in larger measure than would have normally been the case, we should have a more competitive structure from 2020 forward. That being said, the finalists today have of course avoided that scenario and it will be all about glory and disappointment in equal measure at Michael McGirl's and Patrick Guckian's final whistle.

The Connacht Gold Senior decider features almost perennial finalists at this stage, Glencar/Manorhamilton, appearing in their ninth final in twelve seasons. They will be hoping to end a run of four consecutive defeats in finals and take their fifth crown since 2008. We welcome back the market leaders in Leitrim Club Football, Ballinamore Sean O Heslin's, to the big day after an absence of 21 years at Senior Level. With 20 titles to their name, nobody would have predicted back in 1990, when they last claimed the crown that almost three decades would pass before they would gather number 21. We wish both teams all the best today in pursuit of glory.

What we can be sure of today is that the Smith Monumentals title will find a brand new home this evening, barring a drawn result. Leitrim Gaels last contested the final in 2017 and will be hoping to go one better today. In existence since 1997 the club has gone from strength to strength in the intervening years and victory today would announce their ascent to the highest echelon of Leitrim Club Football in 2020. Their opponents Drumkeerin have really deservedly earned their place in today's final and will be hoping to take a first IFC title. Heartbreaking results in the finals of the grade over the past decade will surely spur them to even greater heights as they hope to take the ultimate step to the Senior Football Championship. Best wishes to both teams.

1994 was an unforgettable year for Leitrim Football and today we are delighted to welcome our heroes back to centre stage after a quarter century. GROUND REGULATIONS Páirc Seán MacDiarmada

All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and the Rules and Regulations of Coiste Chontae Leitrim. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.

1. Spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground.
2. The climbing of walls, stands or other buildings in the ground is forbidden.
3. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any objects.
4. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play and shall be ejected.
5. Any person who remains in the gangway or aisle may be ejected from the ground.
6. Any person who fails to comply with instructions from a steward or member of the Gardaí may be ejected from the ground.
7. The stadium management reserves the right of admission.
8. No smoking in Páirc Seán MacDiarmada except in designated areas.

Michael McGirl is a member of the Drumreilly club and has been refereeing for the past six seasons. Married to Fiona with a daughter Emily, and factory employee by trade Michael is a current footballer with his club having played at all grades winning a number of underage medals with the club during the 1990s. He won SFL title in 2004, two Intermediate Football Championships in 1998 and 2007. He also won a SFC B title in 2003. He is currently a member of the Drumreilly Executive Committee and is a former Chairman and Secretary of the Club. Patrick Guckian, a member of the Fenagh-St Caillin's Club has been refereeing for the past six years. An ESB Network Technician, Patrick is former player with his club and has represented Leitrim at all under age levels from Under 16 to Under 21. He was unfortunate not to have won at least one SFC with his club having featured in the County Senior Final on a number of occasions. 1919 - One Hundred years ago

Senior Championship Final : Fenagh 1-2 Aughavas 0-1

There was controversy at the semi-final when Fenagh beat Ballinamore by a point. Ballinamore claimed they should have been allowed a goal as a ball hit the upright and ran along the crossbar – but the crossbar was a rope. They claimed the rope swung and the ball was over the line. The referee didn't agree. A long way from hawk-eye! The final was played at Willowfield, Ballinamore, but, as often happened then, the game wasn't played until 11 April 1920.

1969 - Fifty years ago

Senior Championship Final : Ballinamore 1-11 Aughavas 2-5

The 1969 Final was played in Gortletteragh, in recognition of the fact that the club had just developed their own grounds. An attendance of 1,600 people turned up on a wet day with record gate receipts of £222. Ballinamore were seeking their third-in-row and were at the height of their glory with Thomas Galligan supreme at midfield. The tallest referee in Ireland, J P Newton, was in charge of the whistle.

1994 - Twenty-five years ago

Senior Championship Final : Aughawillan 1-8 Allen Gaels 0-10

1994 was a memorable year in Leitrim with the county team winning the Connacht Championship, Charlie McGettigan winning the Eurovision and the Shannon-Erne Waterway opening.

In Aughawillan, the year is best remembered for the famous Martin Prior goalmouth "lift" which denied Allen Gaels a draw and gave The Willies a three-in-a-row of senior titles. With time up, Aughawillan got a penalty when Frank Smith was fouled in the square and Peter Prior goaled to put them a point up. Martin McGowan got a free to level it but, with the ball heading between the posts, Aughawillan invented the "lift" and Martin Prior soared above the crossbar. Referee, Enda Stenson, headed for shelter as Allen Gaels protested, but Aughawillan had done nothing against the rules!

Leitrim Gaels First Squad 1997

On the 9th March 1997 Leitrim Gaels Gaa Club played their first ever league game in Div 4. Our opposition on the day was our near neighbours Kiltubrid . People from near and far packed into Kitubrid GAA grounds to witness this historic occasion. Kiltubrid won out on a score 7- 09 to 1-06. Over the next few months this now famous “Team of 97” travelled the high ways and bye ways of County Leitrim sowing the seeds for the future playing Sunday after Sunday . Great credit must go to the committee and the team who had the vision and courage to start up the club back then and they should be very proud of themselves of their achievement now by the way the club has progressed since then. The Clubs first ever Championship win was against Fenagh in August 1997. We held Fenagh scoreless in the second half to win on a score line 1-8 to 2-4. This win started us on the road to success. Only 10 years after the clubs formation Leitrim Gaels Community Field opened its gates in 2007 with a much needed state of the art sports field and community centre at a cost of €1.2 million. This was made possible by Community fund raising, Grants and loans, at present there is in the region of €80,000 of a bank loan outstanding.

At Adult Level the club has progressed through All the Divisions in the league and now find themselves playing in Div 1 league for the coming year. At Adult level we have won the Junior A championship in 2012, Junior B championship in 2001 and 2007, Junior C championship in 2009. Div 3 league 2011, Div 4 league 2010, Div 5 league 2004 & 2010 aswell as promotion to Div 1 in 2015 2017. At under age level we have also been very successful l by winning league and championship titles in all grades from U12 to Minor. This year has seen our registration and participation with the LGFA after many years without a dedicated section for girls and ladies.

Leitrim Gaels players have represented their club at County level on the playing field at all age groups from underage to Senior. The club has also a strong tradition of Hurling with 6 of its players part of the Carrick hurling club which won the historic Connacht club junior championship in 2018 while 5 of its players were on the County team which won The Lory Meagher Championship in Croke Park this year. The club has a rich tradition in Scór with numerous County and Connacht titles to our name.

While the club has many happy and joyful occasions over the years since its formation we also had our fair share of sad times also. Today we would like to remember all our past players who have gone to their eternal reward Adrian Whitney, Lorcan Molloy, Frankie Farrell, Ciarán Flynn , James Gilchrist and our first ever management team of Vincent Molloy and Joe Brennan and also all our past members and supporters who have passed away. May They Rest In Peace.

We are proud to be here today contesting the Intermediate final against Drumkeeran as today will create history for either club as both clubs are seeking their first ever Intermediate title. We look forward to continued success in the future and to our loyal supporters and sponsors at home and abroad we say THANK YOU

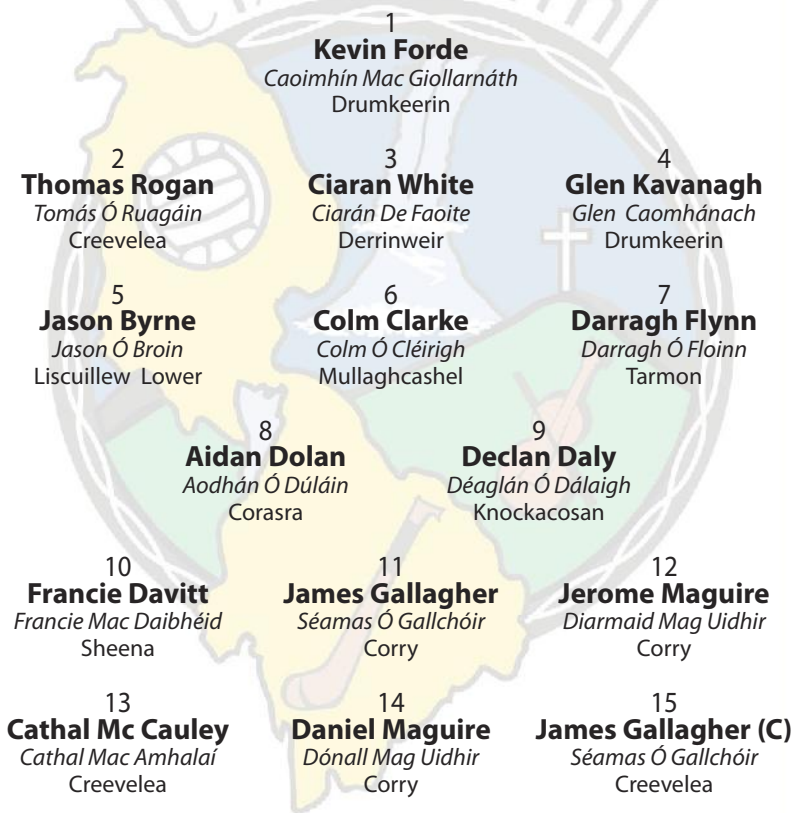

Drumkeeran GAA can proudly trace its history back to 1933, playing their first game on 2nd April for the “London Cup” against Ballinaglera. Brian Hoare, a former Roscommon footballer and teacher in Allenvue National school organised the first team for Drumkeeran in the modern era.

Since its foundation Drumkeeran GAA has grown. Its influence on the community for all ages is reflected in the enormous support for the club and the fact that almost every family in the parish is represented in some manner in all club events and activities.

Our club has been successful in every grade of football. In 1966 Drumkeerin claimed their first title, which was the JFC. The following year the Junior League title was achieved. The club obtained many more successes and titles throughout the years, including MFL titles in 1970 and 1971. In 1975 the senior team won the league and championship double. The Division 2 League title was added in 2016. Unfortunately, in the same year, they narrowly lost in a thrilling IFC final to Séan O’Heslins.

Underage development is a key part of our club and we provide weekly trainings and coaching for our academy. This includes Nursery, U9 and U11 groups. All this is done on a safe environment and overseen by trained coaches. These children progress to our underage teams and get to enjoy blitzes, summer camps and competitive matches. Our underage teams of both boys and girls have had lots of successes over the years winning titles in league and championship competitions in different grades. This is an indication of the commitment and effort of the players and management teams to our club.

Drumkeerin Ladies have also been very competitive at both juvenile and adult level, recently competing in the Junior Championship final. In recent years they have enjoyed the success of winning the Junior double in 2013 and have contested the IFC Finals of 2015 and 2016.

In 1983, Drumkeeran GAA completed the purchase of the new club grounds, Pairc Naomh Bríd. In the 2000s, the handball club facilities were added to the grounds, which included an indoor court and gym. This year, we completed the development of our seated terrace and there are ongoing plans for future expansion for the club grounds.

We thank the players, sponsors, loyal members and supporters for their generous goodwill for the benefit of our club. We wish our current squad the best of luck and continued success in the future.

The bus was waiting at Glancy's of Cortober, green and gold flags blowing in the breeze. Leitrim and Roscommon were as one at that moment, but the Rossies were a little bit jealous when it crossed the bridge and into God's country.

Louis Quinn of Bus Eireann was true to his word, that open-topped vehicle was well hidden until the final whistle in the Hyde – no point in tempting fate. Players and their wives or girlfriends (looking just as glamorous as the WAGS at the rugby or Ryder Cup), hugged and kissed and waved; Declan Darcy proudly held the Cup aloft; team manager John O'Mahony and his selectors and backroom team beamed smiles of satisfaction. Job done. I held on to the base, in case it would be lost in the clamour. That night I slept with John Joe Nestor, at least with his bottom half. Hard and uncomfortable, but it was going nowhere till "1994 Liatroim" would be inscribed on it for posterity.

Thousands and thousands of Jews had waved palm branches as Jesus rode an ass into Jerusalem well over 2000 years ago. For Leitrim supporters it had seemed that long since the Connacht Championship of 1927, so they waved their flags and banners and scarves and pint glasses and jerseys and hats and beer bottles, in salute to the heroes. Carrick was as packed as Jerusalem had been on that first Palm Sunday, so the victory tour round the town took a while. At the clock, Joe Flynn and Sean McGoldrick had the reception platform ready and the cheers could be heard in Tullaghan, maybe even in Jerusalem. Then it was off to the Bush, where Joe Dolan had the steaks sizzling and where James and Peggy and Tony and Bernadette McGovern gave vent to their joy, embracing the players one by one, with a special hug for their clubman Padraig McLoughlin.

Monday's papers gave front page coverage to the iconic photo of Declan Darcy and the 1927 captain, Tom Gannon, with their hands on the Nestor Cup, a special moment in time. The national sports pages devoted column after column to the victory over Mayo and we couldn't wait for Wednesday to come to see the special supplement in the Observer --- and likewise in the Longford Leader, the Celt, the Donegal Democrat and the Sligo Champion. Leitrim was everywhere. The Famine was over at last. All day Monday and well into Tuesday morning McGowan's bus and a cavalcade of cars went from Dromod to every corner of the county, finishing up in Ballinamore, as the sun rose over Lahard Hill.

It is often forgotten that good football is played mostly from the neck up. PJ Carroll was aware of this, John O'Mahony even more so. There would be no more negativity or a perception that a green and gold jersey should shake in the wind at the sight of a maroon, or a black and white, or a yellow and primrose or a red and green. The players needed to have belief in their own ability; to take on some of the arrogance displayed by Kerry or Meath or Dublin or other hotshots of the time; to learn how to put a game away and not be caught at the death; to remember, as Johnno so often told them, that it was the next ball that was important, the next move, the next pass, the next block-down, the next score. A head honcho called Bill was brought in to emphasise the message: no more doubts; away with the notions of being football's poor relations.

The 1994 Connacht Championship draw tested the resolve. Supporters balked at the thoughts of having to dispose of Roscommon, Galway and then probably Mayo to become champions. The players relished the opportunity, as did John, selectors Ollie Honeyman and Joe Reynolds, Dublin based trainer Frank Darcy, the backroom team from the county board and Medical Officer Dr Declan Loftus, everyone on the same page, singing from the same hymn sheet right up until the famous fat lady herself would clear her throat.

The going was not easy. Long hours on the road; up and down the sand dunes at Rosses Point; struggling through the laps in Cloone; heavy lifting and bench presses in the gym; be togged out and on the field at 8pm for training in Kells; challenge matches in Tyrone, Armagh, Portlaoise, Castleblaney; groans and grunts as the physio pounded the flesh and stretched the muscles; late nights; pulled over for speeding; more sandwiches; team talks and meetings; hamstrings and cruciates; carbohydrates and water, water, water; fatigued legs; newspaper and radio interviews; another meeting; more team talks; bandages and sprays; laps and sprints at Longford Rugby Club; tea and more sandwiches; bananas, apples and oranges; mucky boots and broken laces; physio appointments; video analysis; early breakfasts and late suppers; punctures and no spare; drinking and parties and wedding invites all out the window; match Sunday, gym Monday, training Tuesday, team meeting Wednesday, training Thursday, off Friday, training Saturday, match Sunday agus aris agus aris eile.

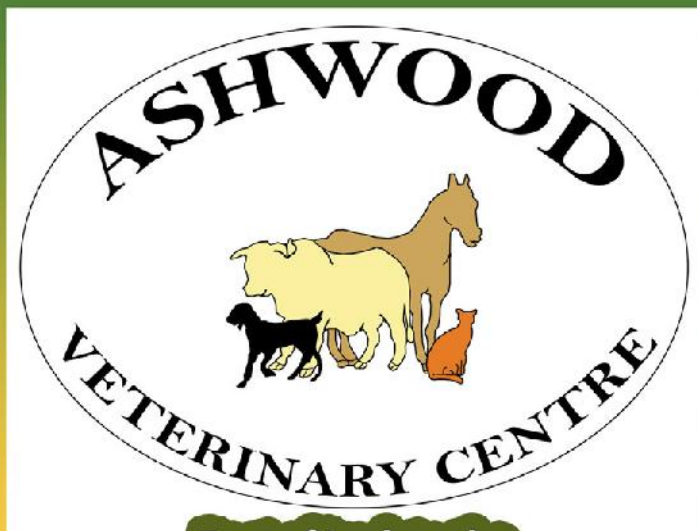
It was worth it all. The players and all involved with the team became a sort of a band of brothers and the people of Leitrim saw the hoodoo broken, while the youngsters had their local heroes, their neighbours and own club members who were now chased for autographs, or a glove or even a sock, anything they could boast had once been worn by a Leitrim star.

The band of brothers will take the field at half time today and they will remember ninety four and all it meant to them -- and all it still means to them -- and to every follower of Leitrim's green and gold. Give them a rousing Cead Mile Failte.

Ballinamore Seán O Heslin's Club History



Ballinamore Seán O'Heslin's is probably the most famous GAA club in Leitrim. Tá Cáil ar an gclub, ní hamháin i Liatroim ach ar fud na tíre. The club is the most successful in Leitrim in terms of titles won. O'Heslin's have won 20 Senior Championships and 22 Minor Championships. The club consistently fields in all grades in hurling and football, one of only two clubs in Leitrim to do so. Since the club was founded in 1889, it has contributed to county teams at every grade and the club is central to every development in the GAA in Leitrim. The club is based in the town of Ballinamore and its players come from the town and a few surrounding townlands.

The GAA was founded in Ballinamore on 31 January 1889 at a meeting in Mc Gauran's Railway Hotel, now the Allied Irish Bank. Sean O'Heslin, a teacher in Ballinamore who was a native of Aughawillan, was the driving force behind the club in its most successful period, the 1930's. Fuair sé bás i 1942, nuair nach raibh ach 55 bliain slánaithe aige. The club was named after him in 1953.

Successful Teams

Ballinamore has been highly successful in every grade of football. The club contested the first ever Leitrim Senior championship in 1890 and reached the final but lost to Mohill. Twenty-three years later they won their first senior championship, in 1913. The greatest periods in the club's history were in the 1930's, when five senior titles were won, and then a prolonged period of success from 1964 to 1990, when twelve senior titles came to the club. Probably the club's greatest achievement was a three-in-a-row between 1967 - 1969. During the 1990's the club had a very strong team, which coincided with Leitrim's period of greatness. However, they failed to win a senior championship after 1990, despite having no less than five players on the Leitrim panel which won the 1994 Connacht championship. In 2003 the club won the Senior B Championship, the club's first senior success since 1990. The Club regained its senior championship status by winning the Intermediate title in 2016. The club won its last minor title in 2011 following an epic match with Glencar Manorhamilton. Ballinamore amalgamated with Aughavas under the name St felims to win the Minor A championship 2014. We won our first U17 championship in 2017 against Fenagh.

Pitch

In 1952, Seán O'Heslin Park was opened, the first GAA grounds in Leitrim. It was the centre for county games of all sorts until Páirc Seán MacDiarmada opened in Carrick-on-Shannon in 1964. It continued to host smaller county fixtures until it fell into disrepair in the 1990's. The club has now completed a major development at the site and two excellent pitches have been developed and a new stand/dressing-rooms have been erected and were officially opened by Uachtarán CLG Christy Cooney on 24 Bealtaine 2009.

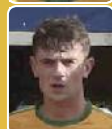

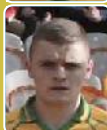

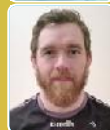

Glencar Manorhamilton Team Captain and Management

It is a great honour for him to captain the saffron and blue today and his leadership will be invaluable.



Shane Ward and Kieran Fox are the Joint Managers of the Glencar Manorhamilton Senior Football Team and are in their second season in charge and they are joined on the line by team selector **Patrick McMorrough**.

Shane is a native of Ballyshannon, Co Donegal now resident in Glencar and is on the teaching staff of St Clare's Comprehensive School. Since his arrival in St Clare's, he has nurtured talent across many age groups and the clubs in the school catchment area have

benefitted greatly from his involvement with their players. With his home club Aodh Ruadh he has coached various underage and adult teams to success, including a Donegal U21 championship, a title he also secured with Glencar Manorhamilton in 2012 as Joint Manager. He went on to manage the Leitrim U21s from 2014 to 2016 and was appointed the Leitrim County Senior Team Manager for the 2015 and 2016 seasons. In the following two years he returned to Donegal to coach the County Minor side. Shane has a wealth of experience in the preparation of teams, is a coach of the highest calibre, is ever alert to adapting to new coaching methods and this makes him very highly regarded in GAA circles. His expertise, knowledge and familiarity with high intensity situations will be essential today.

Kieran has managed all grades of teams in our club from underage to senior level. As a player, he is well known throughout the county as his adult career stretched over a 32 year period. During this time he won two senior championships and was named Man of the Match in the County Final in 1999. He was selected as the Leitrim Senior Club Player of the Year on two occasions in 1997 and 1999, as well as being honoured as the Glencar Manorhamilton Club Player of the Year on five occasions and being selected on the Club Millennium Team. He served for two years as Club Chairman and is currently on the Pitch Development Committee. Kieran has experienced every aspect of what it takes to be successful and his pride in the club, his determination and drive will be a huge asset to the team on county final day.

Kieran and Shane are ably assisted on the line by selector and club stalwart Patrick "Coco" McMorrough. Patrick is a well-known and hugely respected figure in Leitrim GAA as a player, team manager, referee, official and administrator. His knowledge of the players and experience in managing teams will be a key factor today.

The late Tom Guckian, Kiltoghert, Ck-on-Shannon and St. Mary's Kiltoghert GAA Club

Tom Guckian, Kiltoghert, Ck-on-Shannon, who passed to his eternal reward on 1st February 2019. He had a lifelong association with many aspects of the GAA in Leitrim and while he never played underage football for St Mary's Kiltoghert, he always showed a keen interest in all the club's activities and became involved at officer level at a young age becoming Treasurer in 1983. He continued in this role for 8 years, while also playing club football at Senior and Junior level.



He captained St Mary's to a Junior Championship final in 1988, and at this stage his great organisational skills were becoming obvious when he became manager of the club's second team a role he held for 10 years during which he led St Mary's to intermediate title in 1995. This was the year that St Mary's Kiltoghert took the Senior, Intermediate and Minor titles, a feat unparalleled and unlikely to be ever matched.

In 1996 he took over as Chairman of the club and held this role until 2003, during this time he spearheaded the development of the new club grounds at Castlecarrá, affectionally known to all as Park Tom. This was a jewel in Tom's Chairmanship crown and one of which he can be extremely proud. The grounds, which are a hive of GAA activity, have been of tremendous assistance to Leitrim GAA, particularly on big match day in Avantcard Páirc Seán Mac Diarmada.

Fundraising is the bane of many people's existence and many run a mile from it. Not Tom though! He always played a big role in any fundraising for the club and took great delight when his club's lotto team topped the sales figures. In addition to this Tom has been a long time member of the Leitrim GAA Supporters Club Committee and used his talent in this regard to great effect. Tom rarely missed the traditional annual launch of the Leitrim Supporters Club in Dublin and was an ever present on the Leitrim Bus to Dublin for these occasions in the company of his wife Tina.

At County GAA Administration level Tom served on the county Competitions Control Committee for ten years and was its Chairman for 5 years. During this time he was always approachable and dealt with all issues fairly and in the best interest of Leitrim GAA. He left his club outside the door on all occasions when making CCC decisions and that is the very best tribute we can pay to him on his tenure in charge of that committee. In recent years he had been a member of the Connacht GAA Hearings Committee which was a great honour bestowed on him to have been chosen on the ultimate provincial disciplinary decision making committee. Of course Tom has had leading role on many Connacht Council match days around the province in that most unglamorous of roles, the match day steward which involves a time investment or erosion of time, if you look at it another way, that goes way beyond what we normally associate with attending matches.

Tom became Chairperson of the Páirc Seán Committee in 2010 and oversaw many developments at the grounds over his period in charge. An abiding image of Tom on match day would have been his scurrying up and down the tunnel, keys rattling, and making sure all is in perfect working order. Another example of the many unglamorous but vital GAA roles that Tom gladly took charge of, such was his enthusiasm for the association that was such a big part of his life.

As a supporter Tom travelled clocked up many miles supporting his club and county across many age grades and codes. He was particularly proud of the sporting achievements of his daughters Lorraine and Lisa and was their staunchest supporter of their team over the years.

On February 3rd, 2018, Tom Guckian was inducted into the Jim Lynch Leitrim GAA Hall of Fame at the County's Annual GAA Awards Ceremony. This was a fitting tribute to all of the work that Tom had got through in a lifetime's association with GAA and a recognition of the fact that the mountains of work that goes on behind the scenes is greatly appreciated by all. Tom was, in this regard, a hero of many and for all! Tom gloriously captained many great teams whose work goes on off field.

We were greatly saddened by his passing, which leaves yet another large void in the present around St. Mary's Kiltoghert, Avantcard Páirc Seán Mac Diarmada and Leitrim GAA.

The Late Brian Mulvey, Kiltoghert and St Mary's GAA Club

Brian Mulvey passed to his eternal reward on December 28th 2018. He spent the entirety of his adult life in voluntary service to his beloved St Mary's Kiltoghert GAA club. As a player, he was the essence of what a club player should be, selfless, dedicated and above all loyal to the club cause. At underage level he won Under 14 and Under 16 County Championship medals. As a senior player over many years he was a St Mary's stalwart. He played in three SFC Finals, 1977 as goalkeeper, 1983 as wingback and finally as goalkeeper in 1993 but ended up on the losing side on each occasion. When his playing career finished at the club's highest level, he continued to lineout at the lower levels for many years, such was his love for the game. He played with and won an IFC medal in St. Mary's glory year of 1995, the year the club captured a glorious treble of SFC, IFC and MFC titles. He went on to add JFC A, B and C medals as his playing career continued to a conclusion. Beyond his playing days, he moved seamlessly into the mentor's role and was present on the sideline for many of club's teams across all levels from underage right through to senior level, managing the St Mary's Senior team in 2000. He would have been an almost ever present mentor to various successful club teams at Intermediate and Junior level over the years.



Brian was a 'go-to man' for St Mary's Kiltoghert GAA Club and if there was a job to do he would always be willing to help out or take charge of a task at hand. His presence at all St Mary's Kiltoghert GAA events was a certainty, whether leading from the front or helping selflessly in the background. His dedication to the club's cause was mirrored by his volunteerism at Avantcard Páirc Seán Mac Diarmada. On any match day, big or small, Brian was always there. His role as chief steward on big match occasions could not be understated and he worked away in the background ensuring that all occasions were handled with extreme efficiency. His illness didn't faze him in the slightest and Brian just got on with the job in hand. His presence was a certainty and that included the 2018 Connacht Club Championship matches played at Avantcard Páirc Seán Mac Diarmada in November 2018.

Brian Mulvey will be sorely missed by all who knew him across GAA circles at all levels and indeed the many with whom he came in contact with during his long years of service with the ESB. He is particularly missed by his family.

Back to the future for Senior Finalists – John Lynch Ocean FM

The County final day for 2019 has a real feel of nostalgia about it the 1994 Connacht championship will be honoured and of course Ballinamore Sean O'Heslin's and Glencar Manorhamilton will both cast their minds back to significant glory days which also occurred in the same decade as a source of inspiration for today.



Ballinamore Sean O'Heslin's appeared in three finals in the 90's their last success was in 1990 when they beat Aughawillan. Their last appearance in a senior final was in 1998 when they fell short against Melvin Gaels. If you were to say that in September 1990 thirty years would pass without O'Heslin's winning another senior title they would have been calling for the men in white coats and I don't mean the umpires.

Glencar Manor have enjoyed a more trophy rich history in recent times. They of course completed the four in a row between 2008 and 2011. However since then they have tasted defeat in the finals of 2012, 2015, 2016 and 2017. This current side are now looking to make their own history and if the result is in doubt on the home stretch then perhaps by casting their minds back to the final from 20 years ago when the Glencar Manor side of 1999 staged a late comeback to defeat Fenagh with a late goal to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat in the county final of 99 they will gain inspiration.

So there are many links to the past as we are about to crown new champions for this season. Sean O'Heslin's are on a steady improvement graph since winning the intermediate title in 2016, the arrival of Dominic Corrigan led to predictions that they may be the 'dark horse' of the championship and the predictions have been fairly accurate thus far. The semi-final over Mohill was a real character builder and proved to the team that they can mix it up with the best in the County.

The problem is however that the challenges don't get any easier and today Glencar Manor will be confident of finally returning to the top of the tree in Leitrim Club Football. Kieran Fox and Shane Ward have been working on this project for well over two years, they sailed through the group stages and their last two outings against Allen Gaels and Melvin Gaels showed just how impressive and ruthless they can be when they hit form. The match ups will be compelling viewing today and how both sides adapt to different situations that may arise will be key. Don't rule out another day to settle this particular issue.

The Intermediate final has a real novel feel to it. We will also have first time champions at this grade which will be a very special day for the winning club. Leitrim Gaels and Drumkeerin have been here before in the recent past. Drumkeerin were written off against Ballinamore in 2016 and very nearly caused a major shock while just a year later the Gaels were beaten by Aughnasheelin in the 2017 final. Leitrim Gaels are coming in as favourites after seeing off Annaduff. They are now benefiting from an excellent underage structure over a number of years which is now beginning to bear fruit at senior level. Drumkeerin produced true grit to seal their final place at the expense of Ballinaglora. They had a numerical disadvantage for long periods of the semi-final but they played to their strengths and showed huge levels of desire to eventually defeat their opponents and great rivals from the other side of Lough Allen. First time champions at Intermediate level and whoever wins it will earn it.

Finally the county final day is special. I have been working on the 'blue riband' event of Leitrim football since 1996. Each final makes creates its own history, makes its own heroes and even the occasional villain. We are fortunate position to be able to experience it. I know from messages into Ocean FM regarding the online coverage there are many Leitrim folk around the globe that would love to be here but at least for an hour or two technology will bring the excitement of home a little bit closer.

Online radio coverage as well as tweets and posts on social media will help to keep everyone in the most far flung off locations up to date and Whatsapp and Snapchat will no doubt help keep everyone in the loop with how the celebrations are going in the various camps later tonight.

For the club officials who have been organising media days; ensuring the team kit is looking its best for the final and liaising with county board officials about plans for the showpiece day in the local sporting calendar today is also a reflection of the hard work they have put in over the course of the year. Having a good Chairman, Treasurer or Secretary doesn't guarantee success but having these roles filled by strong individuals certainly makes the jobs of those directly involved with the running of a club's teams an easier task.

The County Board Officials you will have seen at games all over the county since the championships got underway deserve recognition as well for the role they have played in the smooth running of this year's competitions. The fact that it is a transitional year to an extent has added an extra dimension to the competitions. Some clubs were fighting for their lives to stay at senior level while others seemed to accept that they would be better off at Intermediate level where they will be more competitive. The County Board deserve praise for the restructuring that will come into place next year and hopefully it will result in even more competitive action, at all levels.


